



'Making nature accessible to people with disabilities and exploring opportunities for funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund'

People with disabilities face many barriers to getting outdoors and enjoying and learning about Scotland's rich natural heritage.

TCV Scotland wants to make Scotland's nature and wildlife accessible to everyone and so has been working with a wide range of people with disabilities in the innovative and inspiring Exploring Nature programme. Connecting with disability organisations, encouraging funding applications from them, and promoting natural heritage projects are all priorities for the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF). That's why this free information event is being organised jointly by TCV and the HLF.

We will highlight some of TCV's existing partnership-based programmes which increase access to the outdoors for people with disabilities. The HLF will showcase some of their heritage projects and explain how they can help you develop your project ideas and turn them into successful funding applications. Representatives from Deaf Action and Scottish Autism will talk about the benefits enjoyed by service users who have taken part in TCV's sensory, nature-based activities. There will also be the chance to meet some participants and TCV staff who are part of our latest funded programme, Jupiter Nature Connections.

Directions

Road:

Jupiter Urban Wildlife Centre is situated north of the M9 between junctions 5 and 6. From Beancross Road, turn north onto Newlands Road, then left onto Newhouse Road, left onto Wood Street, and Jupiter Urban Wildlife Centre is on your right. From Beancross Road, the route is signposted with brown tourist signs.

Car parking is in front of the Centre.

Rail and bus:

The nearest train station is Falkirk Grahamston, which is 2.5 miles away. From there you can get the number 3, 4, 4a or 4b bus, (run by First South East and Central Scotland) for 10 stops, getting off at Newlands Garage and walking 0.4 miles down Wood Street.

On disembarking the bus, walk towards Arnold Clark and National Tyres. There is a footpath opposite on the right hand side of the road that leads onto Wood Street. Continue down Wood Street until reaching a road on the left which the Jupiter Centre shares with Timber Components and is signposted with a brown tourist sign.
